

ASK A PRIEST QUESTIONS:

When researching the early Church (teachings, doctrines, etc.) where do I look for references and to show proof to non-Catholics that the Church has been consistent in its teaching? The earliest writing outside of the New Testament is the Letter of Clement to the Corinthians (80 AD), the Didache, and the Letters of Saint Ignatius of Antioch (circa 110 AD). The Ante-Nicene Fathers series is very thorough but expensive; an alternative is the three-volume The Faith of the Early Fathers (Liturgical Press, 1970), which has sections of early Christian writings from 80 AD on. Another great source is The Fathers Know Best: Your Essential Guide to the Teachings of the Early Church by Jimmy Akin (Catholic Answers, 2010). Akin presents the world of the ancient Church, and then has collected patristic quotes on just about every doctrine you can think of, from the Eucharist to reincarnation.

My friend wants to go our church but his parents refuse to let him go as they hate Catholics and the Catholic Church. What can I do?

Bishop Fulton Sheen often said that those who hate the Church usually hate what they think the Church is. Many Americans will condemn Catholics for things that we have never done, or based on one or two incidents from past history, or the misdeeds of individuals. It would be helpful if you can find out from your friend what the parents are angry about, and then provide him/her with information that your friend can gently pass on to them. Above all, pray for your friend and the family, for the enlightenment of the Holy Spirit, and that the parents' prejudices will be dispelled. Ask your friend to hang in there, be supportive, and be loving toward the parents.

Perpetual Help Icon

One of the most popular icons for both Catholic and Orthodox, our patronal icon, from the late 1400s, remains enshrined in the Redemptorist Fathers' Church in Rome.

The icon comes from Crete, and it depicts the Blessed Virgin Mary wearing a dress of dark red with a blue mantle and veil. On the left is the Archangel Michael, carrying the lance and sponge of the crucifixion of Jesus. On the right is the Archangel Gabriel carrying a 3-bar cross and nails. This type of icon is a later type of Hodegetria composition, where Mary is pointing to her Son as the Way, combined with imagery of the Theotokos of the Passion. The Christ-Child has been alarmed by a pre-sentiment of His passion, and has run to His mother for comfort. The facial expression of the Virgin Mary is solemn and is looking directly at the viewer instead of her Son. Jesus is portrayed clinging to His mother with a dangling sandal, either because He ran so fast to her that His shoe is falling off, or out of respect for her holiness (think of Moses taking off his sandals at Sinai). The Greek initials on top read Mother of God, Michael Archangel, Gabriel Archangel, and Jesus Christ, respectively. The icon was crowned by Pope Pius IX in recognition of the many miraculous healings obtained after prayers before it.

Notice the way Jesus has His hands wrapped around Our Lady's thumb: He turns to her in full confidence. Christ's fingers hold his Mother's right hand, yet they rest quite loosely there. In this lies another lesson. Through the protection of His Most Holy Mother, Our Lord grew to His adulthood and initiated His Saving Work. As she protected Him, she prays for us still to Her Divine Son, as she herself said at the time of the apparition in 1499:

"I am your Mother of Perpetual Help."

In our Byzantine Catholic Church in America, we faced a serious schism in the 1930s over Rome's decree mandating a celibate-only clergy and giving the bishop greater authority over the parishes, and thus ending lay control of the churches. During these bitter days, when tens of thousands joined a new Independent Orthodox Church, Pope Pius XI gave a copy of the miraculous icon to our Sisters of St. Basil the Great, with instructions to pray for healing in the Church. The Sisters began to hold an annual pilgrimage, or Otpust, on Labor Day weekend, the one long holiday weekend at the time during which the working faithful could travel to Mount Macrina, the Sisters' motherhouse in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, as most of them were miners and factory workers. These pilgrimages have continued since 1934, and are an occasion where thousands of Byzantine Catholics come together for prayer, singing, and spiritual discussions for all ages. "The Mount" remains a central gathering point today.

"Mother Mary, I bring this unrelenting pain to you. I place it in your hands and ask that you join it with the passion..." I stopped. I screamed, 'NO! NO! NO! I cannot, will NOT add to your pain, Jesus!" I reach out to take back the pain. Only Jesus had already added it to His passion, His pain. I fall to my knees, bow my head, cover my face with my hands and whisper, "No, please, no. You have so much pain already. Jesus lifts me to my feet and asks, "What do you want to do?" I answer, "I would comfort you, bind your wounds, ease Your pain. Not add to it. He holds me still and gently tells me, "I choose to take your pain. I am pleased that you bring me your emotional, mental, and physical pain and leave it with Me.

He draws me to His heart and adds, "This is part of my love." With a sigh I relax into His embrace as He surrounds me with His mercy, compassion, and great love.
