Holy Father's Intentions / May For the formation of religious and seminarians



Memorial Day

Originally known as Decoration Day, from the practice of decorating soldiers' graves with flags and flowers, Memorial Day is the last Monday of May. After the devastation of the Civil War, communities in the United States began to commemorate the sacrifice of the soldiers who died in that long and costly war. The first Memorial Day was in 1868. Today it is a day to commemorate the sacrifices of all those who died fighting for the United States, from the American Revolution to the conflicts of today.

The Defense Department counts more than a million Americans who have died in the nation's armed conflicts, starting with the American Revolution. In modern times, it's hard to appreciate that only about two-thirds died from battle wounds and that the remainder were victims of the soldier's universal enemy—diseases that are treatable today, but were so often fatal until recently. A National Moment of Remembrance takes place at 3 p.m., when church bells toll the funeral melody, and the U.S. flag is flown at half-staff from dawn until noon local time. Residents of homes and apartments alike are strongly encouraged to fly the American flag on Memorial Day.

Memorial Day is particularly Catholic, because we profess the truth that even after death God cleanses us from our sins and the effect our sins have on our souls. Praying for the dead is not common to all Christian denominations, but to us it is sacred.

We owe so much to those who have died for our freedom, for our ability to celebrate a picnic on Memorial Day. Surely, we can stop and pray for their souls, honor their memory, love the veterans around us, and pray for the healing of all. Our Divine Liturgy includes prayers for "those in the service of our country" for a reason!

Catholic Answers on the Saints hearing our prayers:

"We have no evidence the saints are aware of our prayer requests. How would they even know? They are not omniscient."

We have evidence they are aware of our prayers. You don't have to know everything to know some things, so the saints don't have to be omniscient to be aware of our prayer requests.

We do not know much about how the human intellect works in heaven, but the fact that heaven is a higher state than this life suggests we will have more rather than less awareness. This is also suggested because we will be made "partakers of the divine nature" (2 Pet. 1:4) and transformed to be like God by virtue of the beatific vision (1 John 3:2).

Scripture does not give many pictures of what life in heaven is like, but it shows saints and angels aware of what is happening on earth (Rev. 6:9–11, 7:13–14, 11:15–18, 16:5–6, 18:20). The common understanding is that the saints are aware of our prayer requests through union with God. It is reasonable to suppose that, in the perfect state of heaven, people will have whatever information is relevant to them. Thus, God can make a saint aware that someone is asking for his intercession.

However saints and angels are aware of our prayer requests, Scripture indicates that they are. In Revelation 5:8, the twenty-four elders, who appear to represent the leaders of the people of God in heaven, offer incense to God. We are told that the incense is "the prayers of the saints." In Revelation 8:3–4, an angel offers incense that is mingled with "the prayers of all the saints."

At that time, the term "saint" was commonly used to refer to living Christians (2 Cor. 1:1; Eph. 1:1; Phil. 1:1). It is natural to see these passages as depicting the inhabitants of heaven presenting the prayer requests of the saints on earth to God. This is surely part of what 8:3 means by the reference to the prayers of "all the saints."

What do we mean by saying that the saints can intercede for us?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church: The intercession of the saints. "Being more closely united to Christ, those who dwell in heaven fix the whole Church more firmly in holiness. . . . They do not cease to intercede with the Father for us, as they proffer the merits which they acquired on earth through the one mediator between God and men, Christ Jesus So, by their fraternal concern is our weakness greatly helped." As Saint Therese of Lisieux said on her deathbed: "I want to spend my heaven doing good upon earth."

The principal saints associated with our Byzantine Catholic Church are:

- 1.SS. Cyril and Methodius, the two Greek brothers who founded the Byzantine Catholic Church in Central Europe.
- 2. Three holy brothers from Hungary: Moses, Ephraim and George who moved to Kiev-Rus' in the 11th century. Moses became one of the most famous monks of the Kiev-Pechersky Lavra in Ukraine. George was killed while defending Saint Boris from assassins sent by the saint's pagan brother. Ephraim founded a home for the poor and abandoned.
- 3. St. Nicholas of Myra, Wonderworker, patron of the monastery at Mukachevo, and revered as special protector of the Byzantine-Ruthenian Church.
- 4. The martyrs under Communism: Blesseds Theodore Romzha, Methodius Trčka, Paul Peter Gojdich, Basil Hopko, Petro Oros; Venerable Alexander Chira and Companions. Romzha was executed in 1947 in the USSR, as was Oros in 1953. Three died in Czechoslovakia: Trčka died in prison in 1959 and Gojdich in 1960; Hopko died of poisoning in 1976. Chira died in the USSR in 1983. The Companions are priests who either died in the Gulag or endured persecution for the Faith, all in the Soviet Union in 1949-90.
