Christ is Among Us! He is and Always Shall Be!



Blessed Theodore Romzha, Bishop and Protomartyr of the Byzantine-Ruthenian Catholic Church

Why was the day of Bishop Romzha's feast moved from November 1 to October 31?

The Eparchy of Mukachevo requested this change, because when Soviet rule was introduced in 1945, the territory of Transcarpathia, which was on Central European time, was forced to follow the Moscow time zone, a two-hour difference. Part of the Soviet expansion into Europe included forcing all of the territories annexed in 1945 to follow Moscow time, even though it was incredibly inconvenient for the farmers and workers alike, so as to emphasize Moscow's political control. The murder took place at 10:30 pm on Central European time, on October 31st. The Mukachevo eparchy asked the Holy See to transfer the feast to October 31 in order to accurately reflect the history of the martyrdom.

Biography, by Fr. Chris Zugger

Blessed Theodore was born April 14, 1911, in Velykyj Byčkiv, in Transcarpathia, in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, the youngest of nine children. Born in Austria-Hungary, he became a Czechoslovak citizen in 1919 and died under the Soviet regime, all within the same homeland. His father was a railway worker. He spoke Czech, French, Hungarian, Italian, Latin, Russian, and Rusyn, reflecting

both the multi-ethnic heritage of the area and his solid education in Czechoslovakia and Rome.

He was sent to Rome for further studies at the Russicum. There he learned all about Communism while advancing in theological studies. At Christmas of 1936 Romzha was ordained as a priest in the Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore. In 1937 he returned to his homeland to perform military service. In 1938, he was appointed spiritual director of the Seminary. On September 21, 1944, Romzha was named the youngest bishop in the Catholic world, only 33 years old, and he was consecrated in the cathedral crypt at Uzhhorod due to Soviet air raids; he also consecrated two secret bishops in December. He withstood constant Soviet pressure, after the territory of the eparchy was annexed to the USSR in 1945, to break with Rome and join the Russian Orthodox Church. By 1946, he was the only Greek Catholic bishop in freedom in the USSR. The Soviets could not crush the Ruthenian Greek Catholic Church (to which our parish belongs through the Eparchy in Phoenix), and finally the decision was made by Stalin to kill the young bishop and force the priests to join Orthodoxy, which was collaborating with Stalin. On October 27, 1947, an "accident" was staged in which a Red Army truck plowed into a carriage carrying the bishop and three companions. Soldiers then jumped out to finish the job, beating the victims with iron rods, until they were suddenly interrupted by the local farmers and a mail truck. Since the bishop survived both the attack and surgery, a secret police agent was sent into the hospital to murder him on the night of October 31. In 1949 the eparchy of Mukachevo was shut down by the state, and hundreds of priests, monks, and laypeople were arrested. The Church went underground, led by bishops secretly consecrated by Romzha, to emerge again in 1989. Blessed Theodore was beatified by Saint John Paul II in 2001. All of the surviving priests ordained by him told Fr. Chris in the early 2000s that "to know Romzha was to know Jesus Christ." What a great epitaph to have! "Ask a Priest" questions by Fr Chris

Is Halloween Satanic? Bear with me on this one as it's more complicated than one would think. The origin of Halloween comes from the Old English phrase "Evening of All Hallows" or the Vigil of All Saints, the holy day which is kept by the Latin Church on November 1. This feast day in the diocese of Rome arose after 313 AD, as a way of commemorating all of the martyrs of the previous 300 years, and was originally kept on May 13 until it was moved by Pope Gregory III to November 1, to celebrate the dedication of the chapel of All Saints in the basilica of Saint Peter's. All Souls day follows, the commemoration of all those who have died, offering prayers for their repose in the Lord. Halloween was the first day of the triduum of the Days of the Dead. November became the month in which to pray for the Holy Souls in purgatory, and this devotion really accelerated after the horrors of the First World War, in which hundreds of thousands of Catholics died. Pope Benedict XV gave priests the privilege to offer three Masses of the Dead on November 2 as a result of the war.

There is no connection whatsoever with the Celtic festival of Samhain. That harvest season festival died out after the Irish, Scots, and Welsh converted, and since they didn't use the Roman calendar, they certainly did not have an observance of October 31. Little is known of that holiday and somebody came up with the alleged connection during the Reformation as a good way to stop the Catholic practices of praying for the dead and honoring the saints. Nothing in Celtic stories from the pagan times speaks of witches or devils or anything like that during Samhain.

People in the British Isles used to go from door to door before the Days of the Dead begging for soul cakes. In exchange for the cake, the beggar promised to pray for the repose of the souls of the family's deceased; that is the origin of trick-or-treat, except there was no tricking. Also, medieval people thoroughly enjoyed dressing up for the great holy days, which is the origin of the costumes. Puritan-influenced America denounced these Catholic practices of early Irish Catholic immigrants as pagan. Secular influences brought in bloody gore in the costumes; as Christian influences disappeared from society, in came the ugly things in the late 1960s. Commercial interests pounced on Halloween, making it competitive with Christmas in terms of money spent.

So, what should one do? Have fun on Halloween, but do it in a Christian spirit: think about dressing as a favorite saint; host fun events for children at your home or parish that reflect Christian truths and give kids a chance to just be kids; pray for the souls of the departed. Answering a person's query of "so who are you tonight" and giving a little explanation of the saint you're dressed up as can actually be a powerful moment of evangelization, especially coming from a child! Know your Christian history! Don't accept something because someone says so – research it in books and on Catholic websites, just like I did for this annual question.

SS Cosmas and Damian Nov 1 - SS. Cosmas and Damian were Arab twins and physicians. Icons of the saints depict them vested as laymen holding medicine boxes. Often each will also hold a spoon with which to dispense medicine. The handle of the spoon is normally shaped like a cross to indicate the importance of spiritual as well as physical healing, and that all cures come from God. They belong to the class of Unmercenary Physicians, saints who did not accept payment for when there were miraculous cures. In addition, they were skilled physicians. This was in conspicuous opposition to doctors who in antiquity charged exorbitant fees, to the point of bankrupting people, as related in Mark 5:26. Their most famous cure is that of grafting a leg from a newly deceased Ethiopian to replace the amputated leg of a white man sick with cancer, and so saving his life. The brothers remain very popular in the East, Italy, and Brazil; they are named in the Roman Canon of the Mass.
