Christ is Among Us! He is and Always Shall Be!



SECOND WEEK OF THE FILIPOVKA FAST Platytera Icon/ Znamenie Icon - Our Lady of the Sign, feast day on Nov. 27.

The Sign Icon has two different connotations. One is from the old Roman imperial court. It was the custom that those who served in the palace in the imperial household wore an **emblem of the emperor** on their outermost robe. Thus, Our Lady serves God the Word in a unique way as the God-Bearer (Theotokos) and she therefore has the emblem of the Christ Child, our true King, on her robe.

However, the more obvious way is in her role as the Mother - Jesus is shown inside her virginal womb, as a small Man (to show His Divine Nature is present from conception) and holding a rolled-up scroll in His left hand, to show that He is the Word "through Whom all things were made." He blesses with His right hand. The sacred letters of His Name, IC XC, Jesus Christ, tell us Who He is and His role as the Messiah (Christos). In His halo is the abbreviation for "He Is Who Is", or "I AM WHO AM", the Name which God gives to Himself at the Bush that would not burn on Mt. Sinai, in answer to Moses' question.

Our Lady is standing, with her hands raised up, in the *orans* position. This is how the early Christians

prayed, especially when facing East, to show their readiness to accept the Second Coming of the Lord. She is usually found in this style on the apse wall, immediately behind the holy altar. Thus, above the tabernacle in which Our Lord is present in the Most Holy Eucharist, Mary rises above it as the original tabernacle of God.

Mary is the only human person who can be show in the colors of blue (humanity) and red (divinity) because of her unique status as Theotokos. Her robes are usually marked by three stars: on her right and left shoulders, and above her face. These proclaim that **she is ever-virgin: before, during and after the Incarnation of Christ**. Thus, no human being was involved in conceiving Jesus on March 25, and no other children were ever carried in her womb, which had contained the Most High God. As the living Ark of the Covenant, Saint Joseph would never have considered having intimate relations with her, and like her, he remains virginal and celibate.

The **Root of Jesse icon** shows Mary and Jesus enthroned in a tree that has sprouted from the ancestor of Christ's human nature, Jesse, in fulfillment of the prophecy found in Isaiah 11:1: "There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." In the Kursk version of the **Root of Jesse icon**, Our Lady and Jesus are in a square surrounded by Old Testament prophets who foretold the virginal conception or the coming of the Messiah. Going clockwise from the top right, they are: **King Solomon, King David**, and the following Old Testament Prophets: **Daniel, Jeremiah, Elijah, Habakkuk, Gideon the Judge, Isaiah and Moses**.

As we enter the second week of St. Philip's Fast, and everyone is thinking about gift-buying, baking, traveling, and parties, it is a good idea for us to slow down and think about what can we give to Jesus? Is there a behavior or attitude that needs changing, so as to bring God joy instead of sadness? Is there something we already do that is good but can be better, for example, increasing the time spent in daily prayer or meditation, adding Scripture readings. The prophets warned the People of Israel of their need for reform and change - the same holds true for the People of God today.

"Christ Our Pascha" Catechism of the Ukrainian Catholic Church is available in our Gift Store. The catechism relies on two key sources—the Nicene Creed, and the Anaphora of the Divine Liturgy of St. Basil—for both its structure and its content. The Creed, or Symbol of Faith, is recited at every Divine Liturgy and is familiar to Catholics in both the East and West. As such, it not only reveals God to us, it is the source of Christian unity. The Anaphora of St. Basil describes the entire history of salvation. As we liturgically recall the events of the Passion and Resurrection we become witnesses to those events and share in the new life of Christ. "[Historical] truth and the solemnity [celebration of it] are not at variance," expressed St. Augustine. Christ Our Pascha is divided into three main parts—The Faith of the Church, The Prayers of the Church, and the Life of the Church. These three themes reflect the very essence of Christian Salvation - we are all called to know, love, and serve God. Christ Our Pascha presents the teachings of the Church Fathers and how those teachings fit in with Eastern spirituality. It's a good overview of Eastern Catholicism in general, and it makes an excellent companion to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

Anyone falling out of compliance at any point must immediately cease from their designated area of service at OLPH until such time as they are in compliance once again. The Pilgrims' Thanksgiving, Squanto and the Pope

The Pilgrims were Separatists, strict Calvinist Protestants who separated out of the Church of England because it still retained some elements of Catholic ritual and belief. They also despised Catholic Spain and the priesthood. All this is important for our story. The Pilgrims were supposed to land in Virginia, but ended up in Massachusetts, too late to plant anything. Half of the 102 settlers died. In desperation, scouts stole ten bushels of maize from a Native American cache. The local tribes were not happy to see Europeans, as they had already suffered greatly from diseases brought to the New World. In 1621, a man named Squanto walked into Plymouth, speaking excellent English. He taught them how to plant the stolen maize and raise corn, to trade with the Wampanoag tribes and so atone for the stolen corn, how to fish for the local menhaden, and how to fertilize the soil with the remains of the fish they caught. Most importantly, Squanto served as an advocate and interpreter for the Pilgrims with Chief Massasoit, averting almost certain annihilation of the weakened and distrusted foreigners. The Pilgrims thanked God for Squanto - but they were beholden to the despised Catholic Church for his presence!

Squanto was one of many Natives kidnapped in 1614 by a Virginian and taken to Europe. The survivors were sold as slaves in Spain's Malaga, but Pope Paul III had issued an edict recognizing Indians as "true men" and forbidding their slavery. While in the Spanish Empire this edict was often ignored, not so in Spain itself, and two Jesuits rescued Squanto and the others using this decree. While they instructed him in the Faith, he emphasized that he wanted to go home. They arranged for his safe transfer to London to be sent back as a free man. He spent three years in London, learning English and European customs. He finally was taken to Newfoundland, and there an English fisherman, Thomas Dermer, set sail for the south to return him to Patuxet, his home. He arrived to find his entire people wiped out by disease: Squanto was the sole survivor. He and Dermer were in turn taken captive by the chief Massasoit, whose nation of Masschuset and Wampanoag had been reduced from over 20,000 to a mere 1,000 or so by 1620 due to those European diseases. Squanto set aside his anger and grief and became the interpreter and unexpected savior for the Pilgrims. No Pope Paul III, no Spanish Jesuits, no Squanto, and there'd be no Thanksgiving this Thursday!

When was the first Thanksgiving in the United States? Spanish explorer Juan de Oñate had a solemn service of thanksgiving with a Sung Mass and huge feast for the 500 colonists headed to New Mexico. This was held on April 30, 1598, on the banks of the Rio Grande in Texas. This is reenacted annually in El Paso. The English colonists in Jamestown held services of thanksgiving as early as 1607 in their Anglican chapel. Annual observance of Thanksgiving began in Connecticut in 1639 and Massachusetts in 1660. The entire United States began a national observance in November in 1863, by President Abraham Lincoln. It was settled on the fourth Thursday in 1941.

St Andrew the Apostle – November 30

The feast of Saint Andrew honors St. Peter's brother. He was also a fisherman, and shared Peter's house in Capernaum. He had been a disciple of St. John the Baptist, until John sent his followers to join up with Our Lord. Andrew realized that Jesus was the Savior, the long-awaited Messiah, and brings Peter to Jesus. Like the other apostles, Andrew left Jerusalem after Pentecost to undertake missionary work. Early Church history has him preaching in Achaia and Thrace in Greece and along the northern Black Sea coast. Legends say that he preached at the little town of Byzantium, which later became Constantinople and the heart of the Byzantine Empire, and that he predicted the rise of a Christian nation along the Dnieper river, a foreshadowing of Kiev. In the Latin Church, the Sunday closest to this feast day begins Advent, the four week penitential season for Christmas. Saint Andrew is the patron saint of Greece, Romania, Russia, Scotland, Ukraine, and the Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople. There is a legend that St. Andrew was crucified at Patras in northern Greece, on an -X – cross, instead of the Latin one on which Jesus died.

Mother of Tenderness. He has given you to us and made your Immaculate Heart a refuge for the church and for all humanity. Fill out the slip with the names of the recipients and return by mail or drop them by the parish office no later than Friday, December 20th. This gives us time to scan and e-mail them to Ukraine. Bishop Teodor will place all these names on the altar at Holy Cross Cathedral in Ukraine & pray for your intentions at the Divine Liturgy on Christmas Day. This year's card has a beautiful picture of the Bishop praying for our intentions last Christmas!
